MOTION(S)	 To receive a motion paper and accompanying documents on Mobile Food Hub service across South Cambridgeshire District. To approve to fund for the provision of Mobile Food Hub on a weekly basis for a trial period of 24 weeks (6 months) at a cost of £2,400. To decide to consider the continuation of the scheme after a 16 weeks period based on feedback from residents, local partners organisations and evidence of impact measured by community engagement (attendance, exhaustion of produce supplied). 		
Background	Out of discussions within the Market Development working group and Town Council meetings, Cllrs have been exploring possibilities of how the Town Council could help to bring food and basis at affordable prices in Northstowe to support local residents through cost of living crisis. Material and food deprivation data in Longstanton Ward (by SCDC) show the		
	 Household deprivation – according to the 2021 census there are 264 households deprived in 2 or more dimensions (out of a total of 4 dimensions being education, employment, health and housing). Using the average household size in Longstanton ward as indicated in the census as 2.52, we can assume this around 665 individuals. This is 13th highest in the district out of 26 wards. Universal Credit – There are a total of 455 people on Universal Credit in Longstanton Ward. This the 7th highest out of all 26 wards in the district and has increased 44% in two years. Disability –There are estimated to be 957 disabled people in Longstanton ward – 12th highest out of the 26 wards. Disabled people are disproportionately affected by rises in the cost of living such as the sharp rise in food prices so are more likely to benefit more from using the mobile food hub. What is the Mobile Food Hub? In June 2023, the Mobile Food Hub - Hope on the Go - was launched thanks to funding from South Cambridgeshire District Council, to support communities during the cost of living crisis in the region. 		
	Fresh produce and essential items are being brought directly to villages around South Cambridgeshire to help residents with rising food prices. Some of the items are free and everything else at below retail price. It is the first service of its kind in		

the district. Any resident can access the Mobile Food Hub by turning upon the day (no vouchers or referrals are needed).

There is a mix of fresh and long-life food on offer. Food is coming from both donations and purchasing from local suppliers. Residents will also be able to buy essential affordable items.

The mobile food hub visits several villages. It is in Willingham every Friday 12-1pm.

Mobile Food Hub is funded by SCDC for 6 locations (Duxford, Fulborn, Linton, Orchard Park, Papworth, Willingham), chosen based on deprivation data, and by the Parish Council in Fowlmere. SCDC existing funds has been exhausted for the current stops.

Northstowe current food offer

- Northstowe Food bank: Wednesdays at the Cabin. It has restricted access.
 Only selected people with vouchers can use it (currently about 10 families).
 Note: Food bank users tend not to use their local food bank.
- Sustainable Northstowe Pantry: food from supermarket surplus. Available to all for free, Tuesday to Sunday at the Cabin. Mostly bread and pastries (there is no fridge).
- Northstowe Tap and Social: freshly baked bread and meals. Monday to Sunday. Consumer prices (high).
- Northstowe market: Sunday on a monthly basis (10-14h). Some basics and hot meals, provided at consumer prices.
- Northstowe Foodies: Wednesday to Saturday. Cooked and hot meals at consumer prices.

The mobile food hub would thus <u>complement the existing offer</u> and address current limitations due to: reduced costs, removal of stigma associated with other offers (e.g. vouchers), the diversity of affordable goods supplied (l.e. it is neither all pastries nor just cooked meals; it offer residents the dignity of purchasing the materials they need to make the meals they would want in their own way). In addition, the mobility component also helps manage the storage issues, and lack of retail facilities which we have in the Town.

Issues/items for consideration by the Council

For the Council to consider funding mobile food hub activities for a trial period on an adequate day of the week and time.

• How much does it cost?

- £100/visit to HOPE CIC- it partially covers staff costs, food and essentials purchasing costs, and all the overheads (storage, admin, van costs such as insurance, fuel, repairs etc).
- o Flyers and promotion posters kindly provided by SCDC.
- NTC staff time in promotion (new item and social media, articles) to be considered.

How could it be funded?

- o Town council: Community endowment
- Town council application (in partnership with other organisations –
 Northstowe Foodies has expressed interest): Community Activation
 Fund (Homes England)
- Match funding by other community organisations (Northstowe Foodies have expressed interest but have not committed to amount).
